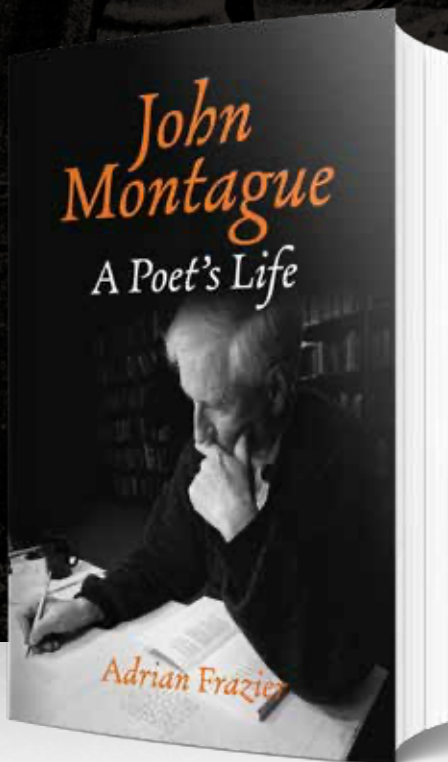

Brian Gormley, a graduate of St Mary’s University College, Belfast, is a locally-born Tyrone writer, producer, actor and performer, is a powerful energiser of local and regional community arts and drama, and all the while also delivers as a School Principal.

Thomas Redshaw, Professor Emeritus of English at the University of St. Thomas, St. Paul, Minnesota, is an established and renowned poetry editor, a long-time promoter and supporter of John Montague, and a generous patron of both ‘A Poet’s Life’ and tonight’s launch.

Adrian Frazier, the author of ‘A Poet’s Life’ and Professor Emeritus of English at NUI Galway, is an acclaimed writer and biographer, was a close acquaintance of John Montague for more than 40 years, and was John’s approved biographer in producing this monumental piece of work.

For those maybe not familiar with us

Tyrone GAA is an avowedly amateur, community-based organisation built around 55 Clubs, 600 teams and 15,000 members, spread right across Tyrone. Our core business is Gaelic games but we also pay considerable attention to our culture and heritage and to developing our communities. Everything we do is aimed at improving the well-being of Tyrone and its people.

Garvaghey is an £8m+ project spread over 43 acres and including seven floodlit pitches, a 30,000 sq ft building, outdoor resources and a five-acre environmental area. Built between 2008 and 2013 it is an inclusive place, deliberately created

Garvaghey is also very much about legacy, about this generation passing on something valuable to the next generation.

Finally, we are very proud that well over three-quarters of the £8m+ cost of Garvaghey was raised by ourselves/the GAA, and that as of 2023, we are now 'borrowings-free' here.
